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Homework makes your home work

If you know what you want a rebuild can work the first time without regrets, writes **Catherine Nikas-Boulos**

Ahroonga homeowners Mary and Anthony Weaver loved their little bit or suburbia. They were surrounded by friends in a neighbourhood they had grown fond of, so the thought of moving did not appeal to them. That said, they were pushed for space, so they really had to make a decision either way.

"We wanted to move house, but didn't actually want to move, if that makes sense," Mary says. "We looked at houses for sale, but once you see something new, it's hard to buy a second-hand house."

When they decided to knock down and rebuild on their property they were determined to get it right the first time and not suffer the fate of so many people who have a list of what they would do differently the next time.

Mary says her understanding of the building industry was so basic she assumed the only way to build a house was to find an architect and hire a builder. The term "project builder" was not in her vocabulary.

The kitchen is another standout. Bigger than the standard Trafalgar on display, the 9m by 7m kitchen has an attached 3m deck.
